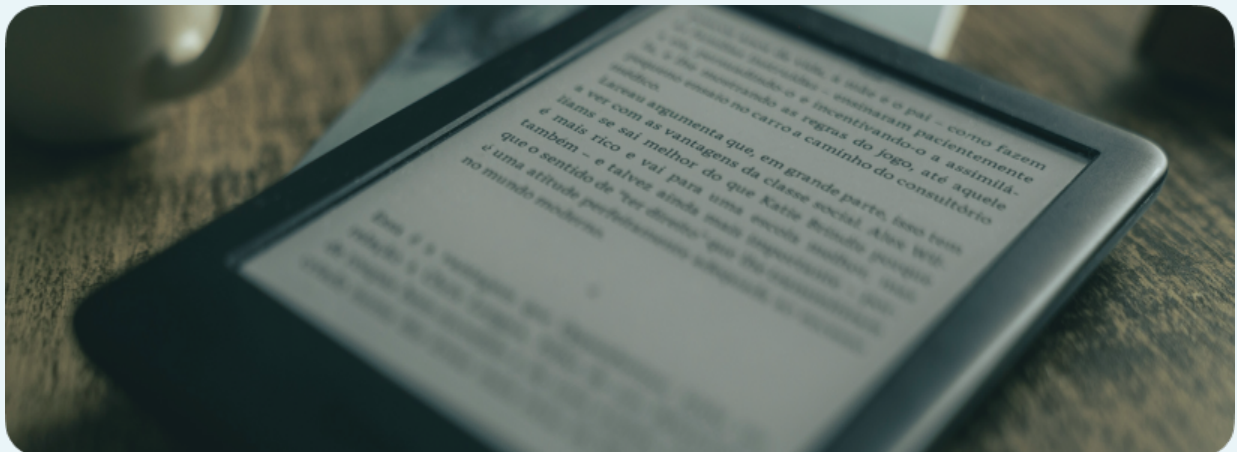


ePub vs. ePDF: Choosing the Right Format for Books & Journal Publishing Success
